10 RECOGNITION

Volunteers are recognised and celebrated for their contributions

5 TIMELY

Volunteers are supported and provided with timely

9 LEADERSHIP

Volunteer managers and leaders are supported to deliver best practice REASONABLE

Volunteers should be reasonably reimbursed for 'out-of-pocket' expenses CLARITY

Volunteers are provided with clear role descriptions and responsibilities 6 TRAINING

Volunteers are provided with training and professional development opportunities

- Do not replace the National Standards for Volunteer Involvement.
- First step tool, adaptive, free and easy to use.
- Support reflection to improve the volunteer journey all types and sizes of organisations.

Principles in practice help with:

- Providing practical support
- Review your volunteer recruitment, retention and recognition approach
- Reimbursements and expenses
- Investing in your volunteer program.


Youth Volunteering Framework



Youth Volunteering Principles

Supportive adult relationships	Adults are available to support and/or mentor young people.
Authentic youth voice	Young people's voices and perspectives are prioritised, and all young people are encouraged to participate and be involved in decisions that impact them.
Youth-led activities – design and implementation	Young people are involved in the design and implementation of youth-related volunteer activities.
Team building	Develop a supportive and cohesive team of young people.
Knowledge and skill building	Focus on preparing young people to lead activities by building their confidence, knowledge and skills (e.g., leadership, critical thinking, decision making).
Network building	Develop community-based connections with internal and external stakeholders (e.g. fellow volunteers, community groups, local government). This legitimises their roles and empowers them to feel respected and capable of creating change in the community. These connections are a critical factor for success and are key to young volunteers establishing and maintaining ongoing volunteer participation and community connections.
Reflection	The activity is continuously evaluated to ensure it meets the motivations, interests and needs of young volunteers. This provides an opportunity for growth, role adaption and flexibility.
Recognition	Young people are recognised for the contribution they make to volunteering activities.


