Work and Development Orders

- The Work and Development Order Scheme is in place thanks to a partnership between:
 - Revenue NSW,
 - Department of Communities and Justice, and
 - Legal Aid NSW.
- Work and Development Orders (WDOs) allow eligible people to clear their NSW fines through volunteer work, courses, counselling or treatment programs.



Legal Aid WDO Service





Legal Aid WDO Service

- Administer the WDO Scheme in partnership with the Department of Communities and Justice and Revenue NSW
- Assist organisations to become WDO sponsors
- Provide specialist fines advice, assistance and representation services to vulnerable clients



Which fines are we talking about?

Fines issued in NSW

Fines enforced by Revenue NSW can start as:

- **Fine notices**, previously known as Penalty Notices and sometimes referred to as outstanding fines
- Court fines, including court costs and victims support levy, and
- **Orders for Restitution**, previously known as Victims Restitution Orders



Options for Managing Fines Debt

- Pay the fine by the due date
- Dispute or challenge the fine
- Enter into a Payment Plan
- Work and Development Order
- Apply for a write off

Work and Development Orders (WDOs)

Work and Development Orders allow eligible people to clear their NSW fines through volunteer work, courses, counselling, case management or treatment programs.











WDO Eligibility Criteria

- Acute financial hardship (includes Centrelink)
- Mental illness
- Cognitive impairment
- Intellectual disability
- Serious addiction to drugs, alcohol or volatile substances
- Homeless or in temporary accommodation
- Under 18
- (and unable to pay their fines)







WDO Activities

Category	Cut-out rates
Volunteer work	\$30 per hour
Counselling and case management	\$50 per hour
Courses	\$50 per hour
Medical or mental health treatment	Up to \$1000 per month
Drug and alcohol treatment	Up to \$1000 per month
Mentoring programs	Up to \$1000 per month



MAXIMUM AMOUNT PER MONTH: \$1000

NB: Excludes court-ordered activities and Centrelink mutual obligation activities.



WDO Sponsors

- To participate in a WDO, an eligible person needs to be linked with an approved WDO sponsor.
- Government and non-government organisations (including for-profit and not-for-profit organisations), as well as health practitioners, can apply to be a WDO sponsor.
- Some of you may be part of an organisation who is already a WDO sponsor.



Work and Development Orders







What's involved in being a sponsor

- Assessing the person's eligibility to do a WDO.
- Using the WDO self-service portal to enter the person's details, and details about the activity they are going to do as part of their WDO.
- Once a month (on or shortly after 15th), in the WDO self-service portal, entering the number of hours the person has completed since 15th of the previous month.
- Keeping a copy of records.
- Closing the WDO once the fines have been worked off, OR whenever you or the client decides to stop the activity.








WDO Sponsor Finder Tool

What's required of WDO participants

- As the sponsor organisation, it is up to you and the participant to agree on what activities the person will do and how many hours they will participate.
- Volunteering as an example:
 - Gardening or conservation work;
 - Companionship roles;
 - Working in a food pantry;
 - Prepping and serving at a soup kitchen; or
 - Sorting donations at an op-shop







Benefits for volunteers

- Reduction in fines debt
- Lifting of licence and business restrictions
- Increased skill set and experience
- Increased employment opportunities
- Feeling of relief and empowerment
- New connections
- Increased motivation
- Increased self-esteem and self-worth


